- China and judicial settlement of international disputes
- China and international economic law

We recognize the significance of interdisciplinary perspectives and are happy to have accepted papers from diverse fields, including law, social science, and beyond.

As the papers to be discussed at the Conference are still works in progress, we kindly request that all workshop participants refrain from citing these drafts or distributing them further unless expressly permitted by the author.

The conference will be held in-person from **31 May** to **1 June 2024** at the Faculty of Law, University of Oxford, but online participation will also be available for those who are unable to travel to Oxford.
