Academic Exchange with Paris-Panthéon-Assas University

You are invited to apply to the academic exchange programme between the Institute of European and Comparative Law, on behalf of the Law Faculty, and the Paris-Panthéon-Assas University. The exchange is open to Faculty members and graduate research students of the Oxford Law Faculty who wish to pursue research at Paris-Panthéon-Assas. Under the agreement, Oxford may send to Paris one eligible person and one graduate student for a visit of up to 3 months between March and September.

The University will not provide accommodation, but dedicated office or desk space will be provided, plus full integration into University life with access to the Law Library and Cujas Institute. A maximum contribution of 1,500 Euros will be made towards the visit, including travel and accommodation costs. There will be no teaching or other formal obligations, although visitors may be offered the chance to present ongoing research. There is an expectation that as a visitor, you will participate in local academic activities, such as discussion groups.

Knowledge of the French language is an asset but is not required in the working environment of Paris-Panthéon-Assas. The exchange programme is co-ordinated by the Vice-President of International Relations of Paris-Panthéon-Assas University (Paris) and the Director of the IECL (Oxford).

Faculty members and graduate research students who wish to go to Paris during the academic year 2024-25 (i.e. between 1 March and 30 September 2025) should submit their application via this Form by 12 noon Friday of Week 0 of Hilary term (17 January 2025). Applications should include the completed application form, a (short) statement setting out your research project and indicating how a research visit to the Paris-Panthéon-Assas University will contribute to the project, a curriculum vitae and a list of publications. In the case of graduate students, the support of the supervisor is necessary.
